DIRECTOR'S MESSAGE

The Institute of Management Sciences (IMSciences) has progressed consistently over the years in its academic programs, faculty development and student development activities. The Institute keeps special focus on imparting education based on life skills, training and research for expanding the frontiers of knowledge and benefit society from all perspectives. We are preparing our students for global competition and our academic programs and curricular activities. The Institute is well recognized in the job market, where 93 graduating students have been hired this year by various organizations as a result of on-campus job drives for graduating students by the Career Development Center (CDC) of the Institute. Similarly a substantial number of students were provided paid internship as a result of the efforts and good repute of the Institute. IMSciences promotes and values merit and excellence regardless of socio-economic status of students. Therefore, the Institute has dedicated an amount of Rs. 118.323 million for scholarships to financially marginalized students, who constitute 45.87 % of the enrolled students. Being a dynamic and progressive organization the Institute has always been responding to the challenges of local, regional and international economic developments. IMSciences has initiated training programs towards providing

trained human resource for the CEPEC projects in collaboration with our federal & provincial government, and various Chinese universities and companies. It has signed a special MOU with One Belt One Road and Rural Urban Development Unit, School of Public Affairs, Zhejiang University China aimed at improving research base of the two Institutes on CPEC projects.

The Institute has taken a lead in responding to challenges faced by our economy, international water management issues and Islamic microfinance. It has signed MOU with the State Bank of Pakistan (SBP) for advocating and increasing financial literacy among Pakistani youth.

IMSciences has special focus on education of Islamic Finance in general & Islamic microfinance in particular, an area of core competency for CEIF IMSciences where it leads on the global level. CEIF IMSciences in collaboration with Ibn Khaldun University, Indonesia and International Council of Islamic Finance Educators (ICIFE) Indonesia conducted two days training on "Islamic Microfinance". IMSciences also arranged a 2 days Specialized Training on Performance Assessment of Islamic Microfinance Institution in collaboration with Islamic Microfinance Network (IMFN).

The Institute always focuses on development of facilities and infrastructures essential for the facilitation of students, achieving academic excellence and promoting research initiatives. Capacity of the car parking facility on the campus has been increased by constructing two additional floors.

The research efforts are strongly promoted by the Office of the Research, Innovation and Commercialization (ORIC) and Research & development Department. The Institute is fostering entrepreneurial and research activities for the development and creation of research and business ideas into successful business and economic initiatives through its centers of excellence, such as Human Resource Development Center (HRDC), Center for public Policy Research (CPPR), Center for Excellence in Islamic Finance (CEIF) and the Center for Entrepreneurship Development (EDC). Students of the province in general and IMSciences in particular will find additional support and guidance of IMSciences Business Incubation Center and IM-Durshal to transform their research ideas in to potential business entities.

Our Quality Enhancement Cell (QEC) ensures that the quality of our academic and research programs is regularly augmented to achieve our core values. This is important in the perspective of developing our graduates to be productive for the society and well equipped with requisite skills to deal with future challenges and engage in research that solves real life problems. Students are provided with exposure opportunities of Corporate Social Responsibilities (CSR), sports and literary competitions and interactive sessions with high profile individuals through various student forums and centers of the Institute, apart from their professional development, in order to groom them into balanced, tolerant and useful member of the society.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Education, research, and Technology are naturally connected and IMSciences is focused on fortifying this linkage for taking into account market dynamics in a practical way. On quality education side, the Institute endeavors to create an interactive environment in classrooms through technology and improved teaching methodology. In this regard, IMSciences is always vigilant for providing trainings and refresher courses to the faculty and keeping it updated and well-developed.

The Institute engages all its resources for the commitment of promoting research activities. Our research journal has been placed in the "Y" category by HEC which is an indicative of its quality and publication on a regular basis. Besides, the publication of 26 research papers by the faculty in various national and international journals is another indicator of our contribution to the intellectual investment. Similarly, 2 research articles have been presented by our faculty members at various national and international conferences/seminars/symposia.

Our other centers, HRDC, CPPR and CEIF are also proactively involved in research endeavors. A total 11 research projects were successfully carried out this year in collaboration with national and international agencies. 9 seminars/conferences/workshops were conducted by our faculty during the calendar year. Similarly, three seminars/conferences/trainings were attended by the faculty.

Fifteen Seminars/workshops/conferences were arranged by Human Resource Development Center (HRDC), Center for Public Policy & Research (CPPR) and Center for Islamic Finance (CEIF) of IMSciences during the academic year. Four of capacity building trainings were conducted by HRDC-IMSciences. Two MOUs were signed with different partner organization by IMSciences for collaboration and mutual assistance in research & coordination in areas of research coordination. All of this shows the commitment of the Institute to promote a culture of research.

On international water issues IMSciences co-organized a five-day training event for water professionals from across Pakistan with International Organization for Water Education (IHE), Netherlands funded by Orange Knowledge Program (OKP) of the Organization for internationalization of Education (NUFFIC). It also arranged Panel Discussion on Pakistan's Water Challenges & Way Forward.

The Institute also provides opportunities of grooming to its students in their career development and prepares them for productive participation in community development and social welfare programs, especially during emergencies. The Institute engages its students to learn resilience through rigorous participation in extracurricular activities and their achievements are commendable. IMSciences hosted 20th Allama Iqbal Inter University Declamation Contest and won first positions in the English declamation contest. Students of IMSciences successfully arranged the Hult Prize on-campus competitions for the second time successfully and "Teek Sho" idea pitched by IMSciences students was declared the best Business Idea at regional level.

In order to coordinate better with the industry and facilitate the students of the province in general & those of the of IMSciences in particular, the Institute has been successful in establishing IMSciences Business Incubation Center and IM-Durshal with the help of Higher Education Commission (HEC) & Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Information Technology Board respectively. Students & researchers will find it easier now pitch their research & business ideas and commercialize them effectively with the establishment of these facilities.

Students of the province in general & IMSciences in particular will find additional support and guidance of IMSciences Business Incubation Center and IM-Durshal to transform their research ideas in to potential business entities. The Institute enhanced the student car parking facility by adding two additional floor on existing car parking facility for the better facilitation of the students. The Institute was able to pass out 406 graduates this year.

3. QUALITY ASSURANCE

3.1. Impact of Quality Assurance at IMSciences

One of the strategic goals of IMSciences has been to increase significantly its collective intellectual depth by ensuring quality culture. The rationale for this course of action has been a significant change in the parameters of what defines success in higher education institutions. Some of this has been very well driven by the Higher Education Commission (HEC) through establishment of Quality Enhancement Cell (QEC) at IMSciences.

3.2. Quality Enhancement Cell

At IMSciences, the QEC is operational since January 18, 2011 as a focal point for providing internal quality assurance. Mr. Basharat Hameed, Deputy Coordinator QEC has been assigned the additional charge of Coordinator QEC of the Institute since January 5, 2017.

3.3. Membership of Associations/Networks

IMSciences is having membership with mentioned associations and networks:

- **3.3.1.** International Network of Quality Assurance Agency for Higher Education (INQAAHE) is a world-wide association that is active in the theory and practice of quality assurance in higher education. IMSciences is an associate member of INQAAHE since 2011 with a major interest in evaluation, accreditation and quality assurance in higher education.
- **3.3.2. Asia Pacific Quality Network (APQN):** The Asia-Pacific Quality Network (APQN) has been developed with the purpose of serving the needs of quality assurance agencies in higher education in the region. IMSciences is institutional member of the network since 2011.
- **3.3.3.** Association of Quality Assurance Agencies of the Islamic World: The Association of Quality Assurance Agencies of the Islamic World was established in 2011 to enhance the capacity of quality assurance agencies in countries of the Islamic World and to facilitate collaboration and exchanges of best practices, experiences and expertise among quality assurance agencies of countries of the Islamic World. IMSciences acquired the membership of the Association of Quality Assurance Agencies of the Islamic World on March 26, 2015.
- **3.4. Program Accreditation/Re-accreditation:** Accreditation of our academic programs with relevant national accreditation councils is one of the major responsibilities of QEC. In this connection, the QEC has been engaged with the following activities during 2018-2019:
 - **3.4.1. Re-accreditation of BBA and MBA Programs:** Our BBA and MBA programs were reaccredited in 'X' category by National Business Education Accreditation Council (NBEAC) in 2018. To address the recommendations of the NBEAC Program Team Review report three follow up meetings for continuous improvement were held during 2018-19.
 - **3.4.2.** Accreditation of BCS and BSSE Program: Keeping in view the importance of the program accreditation, the QEC has started working on accreditation of BCS and BSSE programs with National Computing Education Accreditation Council (NCEAC) in 2017 and submitted Self-Assessment Reports (SAR) of both programs to NCEAC on November 16, 2018. Consequently, Accreditation Inspection Committee (AIC) of NCEAC visited the Institute on December 20, 2018 and both programs got accredited.

3.5. Annual Internal Institutional Performance Evaluation (AIIPE) and MS & PhD Programs Review

6.7. IMSciences Faculty Projects

IMSciences faculty members also engage in activities of societal development in coordination with various national and international organizations. Following projects were carried out during the year. Details of each project are given below.

6.7.1. Afghan Students Zero Semester Program

Higher Education commission (HEC) is working to train and develop six thousand Afghan students under this program in collaboration with its partner organizations. This is a part of the efforts that Pakistan is making in the context of rehabilitation and reconstruction of Afghanistan. The Institute of Management Sciences, Peshawar, being one of the partner organizations of HEC Pakistan is conducting this program. Under privileged war hit Afghan students are trained for six months under this program. The purpose of the training is to enable these trainee students to peruse their studies in various universities of Pakistan in Medicines, Engineering, Information Technology, Computer Sciences, Business and Management education and other disciplines.

6.7.2. English Access Micro Scholarship Program

This program is a joint effort of the US Consulate General and IMSciences, Peshawar. This project is designed for under privileged school going female students of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa and FATA. Each student is provided with an opportunity to get to know the basics of English language and communication

skills. The students are going through a rigorous training of 2 years wherein they have to attend a two and half hours of classes on Thursdays and Fridays.

6.7.2. Socio-Economic Impact Assessment of Rashakai Special Economic Zone

The project was the joint effort of a team led by Shabana Gul, Assistant Professor, Human Resource Development Center, IMSciences, Peshawar & Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Economic Zone Development & Management Corporation.

The project was aimed to identify key potential areas and sectors of the economy for future business prospects and uplifting the socioeconomic status of the people in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa.

6.7.2. Digital Women Empowerment

The project was conducted by a team led Dr. Usman Ghani, Dr. Aamir Taj & Shabana Gul, faculty members, Institute of Management Sciences, Peshawar. The project was designed to bring awareness amongst women members of the society in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa through various awareness program like seminars, TV talk shows and development of a web portal that could be used for better interaction & communicating all relevant information regarding women legal rights. The project was financed by the German International Development Agency GIZ. Total cost of the project amounted to 117,000/- Euros.

7. STRENGTHENING PHYSICAL INFRASTRUCTURE

7.1. Up gradation of Electric Substation of the Institute

IMSciences, Peshawar planned to have its express/dedicated feeder line for its campus under the federal government project "Enhancement of Infrastructure at IMSciences, Peshawar". Installation of all external electrical equipment & infrastructure including electric panel at Hayatabad grid station, conductor, electric and poles were completed in 2017-18 by PESCO. The Institute had to upgrade its internal distribution system & electric substation in order to have safe and smooth electric supply. Key electric equipment including 650KVA transformer and electric panels for safe internal distribution of power were installed this year.

7.2. Construction of Additional car parking for students

IMSciences, Peshawar had constructed a two story car parking facility on the campus for the students' vehicles. The existing car parking facility had a capacity for parking 200 cars. In order to facilitate the staff, faculty and guests, the Institute constructed another two stories with its own resources.

8. STRENGTHENING TECHNOLOGICAL INFRASTRUCTURE

8.1. Digital Library

Along with PERN-2 facility, the access to digital library provided by the HEC gives access to a large number of international research repositories. The students and faculty have round the clock access to the digital library within the campus, however off the campus access to research students is also provided.

8.2. PERN

PERN-2 project was launched by the HEC back in 2002 (previously PERN). The PERN-2 network is maintained by the PTCL and managed by the HEC.

HEC Smart Wi-Fi Blanket coverage and IP Surveillance project is also implemented and 131 Access Points is deployed in the Institute. This project equipped the Institute with the most advanced Wi-Fi technology providing wireless blanket coverage across the institute, enabling users to freely access internet in all open and indoor areas with minimum of 60 per cent of signal strength, power backup units (UPSs) for 24x7 services and achievable data rate of 5Mbps to each user.

Currently, the Institute is utilizing a bandwidth of 156MB lined and 131MB Wireless for its Internet services. IMSciences is providing round the clock internet facilities to all the students and the faculty members along with the student hostels.

8.3. Campus Management Solution

The administrative system of IMSciences was overloaded with manual work for various on-campus operations. These operations range from simple classroom and teacher allocations to more complex tasks including handling and managing financial complexities. Further, due to lack of automated coordination between different sections on-campus, a lot of activities had to be conducted repeatedly that created an unnecessary burden on the ministerial staff and the management. Another aspect of this disconnected/manual system was the excessive usage of paper which was a huge overhead for the institute.

In order to overcome these shortcomings and to connect various operations, IMSciences developed a customized "Campus Management Solution" in OpenERP Version 5 that connected all sections and departments of the campus and facilitates the management in saving the time from petty tasks to investing more time in policy making. Other key aspects of the "Campus Management Solution" is that it targets all the vital operations both at the academic as well as at the administrative level and its extensive reporting system helps the senior management in making quick decisions regarding financial, administrative and academic matters.

Due to technological advancement, the existing open ERP version 5(Desk top version) is in the process of up-gradation to the latest version 11 (Web version). The up-gradation of the basic/core module will be completed this year while complete up-gradation & customization of all the modules will take further one year.

9.6 Memorandum of Understanding signed between IMSciences Peshawar & School of Public Affairs, Zhejiang University China

A Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) was signed between the Institute of Management Sciences, Peshawar, Pakistan and Republic of China – One Belt One Road and Rural Urban Development, School of Public Affairs, Zhejiang University China.

The MoU is aimed at improving research base of the two Institutes. This shall be done through mutual collaboration and cooperation between the two institutes in the areas of academic exchange, joint research activities, joint publications and data sharing, as agreed upon by both the parties. Through the exchange of researchers, research members of the two Institutes can develop joint research projects with similar interest. They may apply to spend a quarter or a shorter period at the other institution serving as a visiting research staff to undertake assigned duties. The faculty member exchanged between the two institutions would be provided with proper researcher status, research facilities and other assistance necessary for conducting his/her research at the host institution.

The MoU shall remain effective for a duration of 3 years. It will be automatically renewed for further 3-year periods unless either party gives notice of termination not later than nine months prior to the expiry of the cooperation protocol.

9.8 IMSciences, Peshawar arranged TMT on Gender, Water management & climate adaptation

The Center for Public Policy Research at the Institute of Management sciences together with International Education for Water Education (IHE), Netherlands has co-organized a five-day training event for water professionals from across Pakistan. The event is funded by Orange Knowledge Program (OKP) of the Organization for internationalization of education (**NUFFIC**).

The training material has been developed by IHE Delft resource persons covering key water issues in water governance including trans-boundary water issues, WASH, Integrated water management, policy and institutional environment of water governance, policy and politics of climate adaptation and other key

topics. Together with international experts, national experts too have been invited as resource persons and panelists.

The opening ceremony was addressed by Dr. Muhammad Mohsin, Director IMSciences Peshawar, Professor Margret Zwarteveen head of IHE Delft, Ms. Josephine Frantzen, Charge d'Affairs Embassy of Netherlands, and Ms. Sitara Ayaz chairperson standing committee on climate change.

Around 40 participants from across Pakistan have been competitively chosen to participate in the training. These participants come from government, academia, media, international organizations and private sector. CPPR intends to set in motion a water network based on this training for awareness, advocacy and knowledge creation both for academics and practitioners.

9.9 IMSciences arranged Panel Discussion on Pakistan's Water Challenges & Way Forward A high panel discussion was arranged by Center for Public Policy Research (CPPR), Institute of Management Sciences Peshawar on "Pakistan's water challenges in the context of climate change and way forward" on 29 Jan 2019. The panel has been organized as part of a five-day training co-organized by IMSciences Peshawar and IHE Delft Institute for Water Education, which is the largest international graduate water education facility in the world. The event is supported by the Orange Knowledge Programme of the Dutch organization for internationalization of education (**NUFFIC**), Government of the Netherlands.

Panelists include Ex-Ambassador Mr. Shafqat Kaka Khel, Senator Agha Shahzaib Durrani, Josephine Frantzen Charge d'Affairs Embassy of Netherlands, Professor Margret Zwarteveen IHE Delft, and Senator Sassvi Palejo. Key questions raised included the most pressing water challenges of Pakistan in the context climate change, the growing demands of different sectors particularly agriculture, crucial policy decisions in the making, construction, decision making processes for allocation of scarce water resources given the competing demands for different sectors as well as ensuring water rights for all. An interesting aspect of the discussion revolved around how Pakistan can strengthen its institutional capacity to address water challenges through collaboration with the Netherlands and other water specialized countries.

The panel identified some critical questions of the highest priority for further political and academic debates, research and potential avenues of collaboration between the Dutch water expertise and Pakistan's water sector. While there were differences in policy recommendations, fair distribution of water and shrewd water management were the consensus points made by the Senators and endorsed by the rest of panelists.

9.11 IMSciences hosted Seminar and Panel Discussions on Pak Afghan Trade

This was stated by Muhammad Shehzad Arbab, Adviser to Prime Minister on Establishment while addressing a one day international conference on Pak-Afghan Trade: Achieving regional Peace through trade jointly organized by Institute of Management Sciences (IMSciences) & Regional Forum for Peace & Development (RFPD) at IMSciences Peshawar. Mr. Shehzad Arbab also mentioned that present Government is very keen to increase the volume of trade with Afghanistan for achieving regional peace and prosperity. He mentioned that Prime Minister Imran Khan has instructed relevant departments to ensure Torkham border remain open 24/7 to facilitate traders of both sides and encourage trade developmental activities which will bring prosperity in the region. Prior to this Mr. Jiang Han, Political Counselor at Chinese Embassy in Pakistan at Islamabad while speaking on

the occasion mentioned that China is keenly interested in development of Pakistan-Afghanistan Trade activities for the betterment of regional peace & economic development.

Mr. Jiang Han also mentioned that active participation of Pakistan's Prime Minister in 2nd BRI international Summit last week in China shows that China & Pakistan are keenly interested in peaceful development of economic activities to achieve prosperity in the region. He informed the participates that recently held 2nd International BRI Summit was attended by 40 Heads of States & international organizations apart from 6000 representatives from 150 countries and 92 international organization, the Chinese diplomat also mentioned that CEO Conference on the occasion signed more than USD 64 Billion worth project cooperation agreement which shows the economic & commercial worth of this international event. In his opening remarks Dr. Muhammad Mohsin Khan, Director IM Sciences said the trade volume between Pakistan and Afghanistan has decreased in the last few years from USD 2.2 billion in 2012-13 to USD 1.5 Billion in 2017-18, this is very serious and need to take steps for the improvement of trade activities both sides of the border in the larger interest of both countries and region. Dr. Mohsin Khan also mentioned that, notwithstanding, the material benefits, trade also ensure people to people contact and hence result in many desirable social outcomes such as peace, mutual trust and enhanced cooperation among the trade partners. Moreover; trade interdependence make wars and conflicts expensive and hence it helps in maintaining peace at the borders.

INSTITUTE OF MANAGEMENT SCIENCES NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 2018

1 LEGAL STATUS & OPERATIONS:

The Institute of Management Sciences (the Institute) is an autonomous body formed under a notification of the Government of N.W.F.P wide /SO(UE)1-47/98 dated June 12, 1999. Later on the Institute was granted the status as a statutory entity through the promulgation of the Institute of Management Sciences Ordinance, 2002 by the Governor of the N.W.F.P on October 02, 2002.

The Institute has launched a number of degree and post degree programs with the mission to be a centre for the transmission, diffusion and extension of knowledge and management studies and allied disciplines, entering to the high level professional and technical man power requirements both from the private and public sectors segments of the country.

2 BASIS OF PREPARATION:

2.1 STATEMENT OF COMPLIANCE

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles as applicable in Pakistan.

2.2 Functional and presentation currency

These financial statements are presented in Pakistan Rupees, which is also the Institute's functional currency. All the financial information presented in Pak rupee has been rounded-off to the nearest rupee.

3 BASIS OF MEASURMENT

- 3.1 These financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention except as otherwise stated.
- 3.2 The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with the approved accounting standards requires management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of policies and reported amount of assets and liabilities, income and expenses. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

Significant areas requiring the use of management estimates in these financial statements relate to the useful life of depreciable assets.

4 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICES

The significant accounting policies applied in preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all years presented, unless otherwise stated.

4.1 Operating fixed assets

Operating fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment, if any. Depreciation is charged on reducing balance method at the rates stated in note 5.1 Depreciation on additions is charged from the day on which the asset is put to use and on disposals, up to the day the asset has been in use.

The assets' residual values and useful lives are reviewed and adjusted if appropriate, at each financial year end. The effect of any adjustment to residual values and useful lives is recognized prospectively as a change of accounting estimate.

Disposal of assets is recognized when significant risks and rewards incidental to the ownership has been transferred to buyers. Gains and losses on disposal are determined by comparing the proceeds with the carrying amounts and are recognized in the statement of comprehensive income.

Subsequent costs are included in the assets' carrying amount and recognized as a separate asset as appropriate, only when it is probable that the future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the Institute and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. All other repairs and maintenance costs are charged to the statement of comprehensive income as and when incurred.

4.2 Long term deposits

Other receivables are recognized at nominal amount which is fair value of the consideration to be received in future.

4.3 Advances, prepayments and other receivables

These are stated at their nominal values not off any allowance for uncollectable amount (if any). Other receivables are recognized at nominal amount which is fair value of the consideration to be received in future.

4.4 Investments

(i) Investments at fair value through profit or loss:

Financial assets are measured at fair value through profit or loss if doing so eliminates or significantly reduces a measurement or recognition inconsistency that would otherwise arise from measuring assets or liabilities or recognizing the gains and losses on them on different basis.

(ii) Investments measured at amortized cost:

The financial assets are initially classified on the basis of its business model for managing the financial assets and the contractoal cash flow characteristics of the financial asset.

A financial asset shall be measured at amortized cost if both of the following conditions are met:

- (a) The asset is held within a business model whose objective is to hold assets in order to collect contractual cash flows.
- (b) The contractual terms of the financial asset give rise on specified dates to each flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

(iii) Available-for-sale investments

Available-for-sale financial assets are non-derivatives that are either designated in this category or not classified in any of the other categories. They are included in non-current assets unless management intends to dispose of the investment within 12 months of the balance sheet date. Gains or losses from changes in fair values are taken to equity until disposal at which time these are recycled to profit and loss account.

(iv) Loans and receivables

Investments are classified as loans and receivables which have fixed or determinable payments and are not quoted in an active market. These investments are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any impairment losses.

4.5 Cash and Cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents are carried in the balance sheet at nominal amount. For the purpose of the statement of cash flows, each and each equivalent comprise of cash in band and balance with banks,

4.6 Creditors, accrued and other liabilities

Liabilities for creditors and other amounts payable are stated at cost which is the fair value of the consideration to be paid in future for goods and services received, whether or not billed to the institute.

4.7 Provisions

Provisions are recognized in the balance sheet when the Institute has a legal and constructive obligation as a result of past events and it is probable that the outflow of economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation and their reliable estimate of the amount can be made. However, provisions are reviewed at each reporting date and adjusted to reflect current best estimate.

4.8 Staff retirement benefits

4.8.1 Contributory provident fund

The Institute operates contributory provident fund scheme for regular employees. Monthly contributions are made to the fund at 10% of basic salary both by the Institute and employees. The Institute's contribution is charged to the income and expenditure account.

4.8.2 Gratuity fund

The Institute also operates a gratuity scheme for its employees effective from July 61, 2010. The employees completing five (5) years continuous service with the Institute will be eligible for the payment of gratuity in accordance with the Employees Gratuity Fund Rules.

4.9 Revenue recognition

Income from students' fee is recognized as revenue over the period of instruction.

Income from examination fee, seminars and conferences are recognized as revenue when the examinations, seminars and conferences are held.

Return on investments and saving accounts is recognized on accrual basis with the assumption that investments will be realized on the respective maturity dates.

4.10 Foreign currencies translation

Transactions in foreign currencies are translated into Pak Rupee using the exchange rate prevailing at the dates of the transaction.

4.11 Taxation

The Institute being established solely for educational purposes and not for profit, has availed approval under sub-section 36 of section 2 of Income Tax Ordinance 2001 for non-profit organization. Section 100(C) "Tax credit for certain persons" of Income Tax Ordinance 2001 allows 100% tax credit on tax payable by non-profit prganization and hence income of the institute is not taxable.

4.12 Appropriation of General Funds

Appropriation of General Funds are recognized in the financial statements in the period in which these are approved.

4.13 Grants

(i) Recurring grants received from donors

These are presented as a credit in the income statement for the year.

(ii) Restricted grants received from Government

- (a) Grants related to assets are presented in the financial statements as "Deferred Income" and are recognized in the income statement on a systematic basis over the period in which the related costs are recognized as "expense".
- (b) Grants other than for assets are credited in the income statement of the year as "other income" to match the expenses covered against the grants.

(iii) Restricted grants received from donors

Grants received from donors are to be used in accordance with the stipulations attached therewith,

16 CONTINGENCIES & COMMITMENTS

- 16.1 The Institute was established in June 1999 and launched its operations at the University of Peshawar (UOP) staying there for eighteen (18) months before shifting to its rented Campus in year 2001. The Institute was initially charged a sum of Rs. 15.94 Million for availing facilities and services of teaching staff of UOP during that period, which was reduced to Rs. 7.60 Million through negotiations and a sum of Rs. 1,40 Million was paid subsequently. However, the matter is still not settled since the Institute has also filed a counter claim of Rs. 4.80 Million, comprising non payment of recurring grant of Rs. 3.98 Million and excess charges for facilities of Rs. 0.82 Million by UOP. No provision has been made in these financial statements.
- 16.2 A case was filed in the court of Senior Civil Judge, Peshawar by the Institute for the recovery of security deposit of Rs. 300,000-for the premises vacated by the Institute during October 2001. However the landlord has not refunded the security deposit despite decision of case in favor of the Institute. A petition has been filed by the Institute for performance of decree issued in favor of the Institute and the court's decision is awaited. No provision has been made in these financial statements against the doubtful recovery of deposit.

12. OFFICE OF RESOURCE GENERATION/DEVELOPMENT:

IMSciences is continuously working with corporate sector, donors and development organizations to improve the living standards of local communities FATA, Khyber Pakhtunkhwa and the whole country at large, by providing financial aid opportunities.
